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Page 69 Q. And you mentioned at the end of your answer that John Olson led the selection process, but then there were interviews. Were you involved with the interviews? A. Yes. Q. And who was interviewed?

A. I wish I could remember all of the names. What happened is on the day of the interviews, one of the parties backed out. And it was a firm out of Bellevue actually, who had done work with, I think it was the Mead School District.

Q. Mead?

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A. Mead, yes, and some other school districts. So he -- his firm had knowledge of schools, but he wasn't an educator. The other, again, I don't remember the name of the firm, but she -- she was interviewed, and then -- and then Blackstone and Westinghouse.

Q. All lawyers?

A. Yes.

Q. Do you remember when those interviews took place?

A. I don't.

Q. And Mr. Blackstone and Mr. Westinghouse were among the people who had reached out asking to do the A. Yes.

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Q. And had a background in criminal investigations because of that?

A. Yes.

Q. Were you aware that they had worked on hundreds of criminal cases over the years?

A. No, I wasn't aware of how extensive that background was.

Q. Did you feel that the WIAA needed people with long experience in criminal investigations to do this investigation?

A. No.

Q. Had you ever selected a former federal prosecutor for other WIAA investigations?

16 Q. The three investigations that you talked 17 about, Eastside Catholic, Bishop Blanchett and 18 Lakeside, are those the only other WIAA investigations 19 that you are aware of?

20 A. No. There was one that was done about --21 about four or five years ago with the Taholah School 22 District.

A. I don't remember how -- how Mr. Olson found them, if they had contacted him, contacted our office, or -- or how they were -- they were found.

Q. What did you understand during this, you know, roughly, let's say August-September 2015, about Mr. Blackstone and Mr. Westinghouse's professional background?

A. They were retired federal prosecutors. They had done work with the Tacoma School District, and the Seattle School District. And at that time the most recent work they had done was with the situation with the Garfield music teacher who had been released because of something that had happened when -- I think it was the choir, Garfield High School choir was on tour and something had happened, and she had been released.

Q. And did you understand that that was the work that they had done for the Seattle schools, was this recent work on the Garfield music teacher?

A. I knew that was one. I thought there was more, but that might -- but I knew that was one of the pieces of work they had done.

Q. And did you understand that they had had, both of them, long careers as federal prosecutors?

A. It's down on the coast, kind of over by 2 Olympia, further west.

> Q. For any of the previous WIAA investigations, had you ever selected somebody with a background primarily in criminal work?

A. No.

Q. And before the Bellevue football investigation had you ever released the names of the investigators to the press at the outset of the investigation?

A. No.
